Catechetical Comments

A Series

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This month we continue our look at The Close of the Commandments:

What does God say about all these commandments? He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." [Ex. 20: 5–6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Question 80. How many kinds of sin are there?

There are two kinds of sin: original sin and actual sin.

81. What is original sin?

Original sin is that total corruption of our whole human nature that we have inherited from Adam through our parents.

The *Catechism 1991* now takes up the question: "How many kinds of sin are there?" This it answers very succinctly: "There are two kinds of sin: original and actual sin."

Then it asks, "What is original sin?" The answer: "Original sin is that total corruption of our whole human nature that we have inherited from Adam through our parents." This answer is supported by the follow Scripture passages:

Psalm 51:5 – Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me.

John 3:6 – That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit.

Romans 5:12 – Sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned.

Eph. 4:22 – Put off your old self, which belongs to your former manner of life and is corrupt through deceitful desires.

Original sin is the condition of sin in which we were born. You could call it an inherited trait. As you inherited the color of your hair and eyes, the general shape of your face, even the tone of your voice from your parents, you inherited other traits as well. Personality traits, for instance, can be traced to one's parents.

Sinfulness is another trait you inherit from your parents, just as they inherited it from their parents, etc. This can be traced, as Paul says in Romans 5, to the original man, Adam, who, together with his wife, set the human race onto the course of sinful behavior.

Properly understood, *original* sin is the root, or source, of the sins we commit. It is the inclination to sin and the reason why we sin. An apple tree bears apples because it is an apple tree. The tree comes first and then the fruit. *Original* sin is the tree from which the fruit of sinful actions is born.

The fullness of what Jesus came to accomplish in His suffering and death will be fully realized in the resurrection on the Last Day. In that day the words of Jesus concerning His suffering and death will come true: "Behold, I make all things new" (Rev. 21:5).

SEPTEMBER 2021 LADIES AID/LWML YEAR IN REVIEW

October 10,2020

Fifty handmade quilts, 85 school kits and 100 personal care kits were shipped to LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF to be distributed all over the world to those in need.

October 15, 2020, through November 25, 2020

"CALL TO ORDER BAKE SALE" Proceeds totaled \$1992. We had 14 volunteers (members and a few husbands) and 62 households that ordered bakery items. Our proceeds were used toward missions as well as for Trinity Church and School projects.

December 12, 2020

A group of ladies visited with member, Char Elliot, on her 90th Birthday.

December 16-18, 2020

Prepared food and collected many items to fill 30 Christmas Cheer Baskets which we delivered to our shut-ins, plus seven personal gifts were purchased and delivered to those shut-ins living in nursing homes or assisted living facilities. Trinity participated in an ingathering for Bella Medical Clinic, which serves those affected by unplanned pregnancy through caring, support, education, and community outreach, while respecting all human life. Bella seeks to lead their clients towards a relationship with God. Trinity donated numerous bags of baby items to the clinic.

April 20, 2021

Meeting with speaker, Martha Baldwin from Pillars (Appleton homeless shelter). Our sewing group continues to support Pillars throughout the year with many quilts and other bedding items.

May 18, 2021

Salad and dessert supper with Bible study, "Life is like Swiss Cheese."

JUNE 22, 2021

Longtime member of Trinity, Norb Pomerenke, attended our meeting. He gave a beautiful testimony of what it means to be a joyful and willing servant for his Lord and at Trinity. At some time Norb has most likely touched every wall in our church and school campus with his paint brush. It is a joy to talk with Norb and he has much to share.

We came away from both Char's and Norb's interviews with thankful hearts for those that have paved the way for us.

JUNE 24-27, 2021

The National LWML Convention was held in Lexington, Kentucky, June 24-27. Trinity participated in helping choose the National Mite Selections. Twenty-eight were chosen out of 34 applications. The total amount to fund these grants is \$2,150,000 over the next two years. Twenty-five percent of the mites we collected here at Trinity and send to our SWD goes for the national funding. Trinity's contribution to mites in the last year was \$752. Our South Wisconsin District adopted a two-year mite goal of \$205,000 in 2020.

July 22, 2021

River Tyme Riverboat Cruise out of DePere onto the Fox River; 21 attended this fun event.

August 17, 2021

100 personal health kits and 100 school kits were assembled, plus 52 quilts are ready to send to Lutheran World Relief on October 2.

September 21, 2021

Fellowship and potluck supper plus organizational meeting for October 2021-September 2022.

October 2020 - September 2021

Our sewing group has donated the following during the last year, in addition to the 52 quilts for Lutheran World Relief:

- PILLARS: 187 quilts, 60 blankets, 137 sheets, 320 pillowcases, pillows, and towels
- CLOTHES CLOSET: 34 guilts, 9 blankets, 12 sheets, 11 pillowcases, 16 bedspreads
- HARBOR HOUSE: 12 fleece blankets

Many encouraging cards, phone calls, and visits are made by our members along with daily prayer for our Trinity Family.

Our Trinity Ladies Aid/LWML group is always very thankful to our Trinity Family for supporting our fundraisers and service projects in a very generous way. Similarities and Differences Between the Flu and COVID-19

Both are contagious respiratory illnesses caused by different viruses. COVID-19 is caused by infection with coronavirus, first identified in 2019. The flu is caused by infection with an infectious virus.

COVID-19:

- spreads more easily than flu. After more people are vaccinated, the spread of the virus should slow down.
- can cause more serious illnesses in some people.
- also takes longer before people show symptoms and continues for longer periods of time.
- COVID, flu, and other respiratory illnesses are similar, and the difference cannot be made based on symptoms alone.
- Testing is needed to tell what the illness is, and to confirm the diagnosis.

SIMILARITIES:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of Breath
- Fatigue
- Sore Throat
- Runny Nose
- Muscle Pain
- Headache
- Vomiting/Diarrhea
- Change in, or loss of, taste and smell-most frequently with COVID-19.



DIFFERENCES:

- With the flu, one or more days can pass between when a person becomes infected and when he or she starts to experience symptoms.
- When someone has COVID-19, it can take longer to experience symptoms than if they had the flu.
- The flu spreads person-to-person with close contact.
- The flu spreads mainly by large and small particles containing virus,
- The virus that causes COVID-19 is more contagious than the flu virus. COVID-19 can easily spread to a lot of people.

Again, it is very important to wear a mask.

Do not get with crowds of people.

Wash your hands diligently.

Becoming a part of a community takes time. Sometimes it requires showing up even when it doesn't seem to be noticed.

Of course, at school, one form of community comes in the form of classes. This year I am teaching 1st grade ELL alongside their classroom teacher, 4th-5th high level ELL, 9th grade ELL, 9th grade literature, high school drama and starting next week 5th grade resource U.S. history. Another smaller form of community building is story time before school. "Story time!" the younger kids will shout gleefully as I walk out of the building in the morning. Although the first week stories consisted of ones like "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" and "Jack and the Beanstalk" that I could tell from memory. Now, I'm bringing books outside with me that the kids and I read together while they wait to be allowed inside the building. Finally, doing dismissal at the end of the day means that parents, drivers and students and I all get to at least know each others' faces. Some parents or drivers will just wave now, knowing that I know which children belong to them and will call the right names. Other parents or drivers will come up to have a chat while they wait. Sometimes little siblings who aren't old enough for school will come over for a chat, too!

From the trips to the Holy Mountain Lavra last spring and to Georgia at the beginning of the summer, another community has been slowly growing in the form of a circle of friends who live in Kyiv but are not connected to school/work. Over the summer we would meet for coffee and/or go for walks around the various parks in the city. One of these friends ended up asking me if I would consider helping a friend of hers who wants to practice her conversational English, so now the two of us meet once a week for that.

It's been such a blessing to be able to attend church in person all summer! It's a small church within walking distance from my flat. In one of the books that I read over the summer, the author writes,
"Worship is not simply the obedient response to
witnessing God at work in our lives. It does
something necessary in our souls," and after nearly a
year of online church, it has been special to be back
and worshiping God in community with others!

These relationships in these different communities then open doors for deeper conversations. For example, we're only in the third week of school, but some of my ninth graders in their journals have shared some beautiful, deep things about how they understand faith or how having a relationship with Jesus changes our lives.

It was a joy and a privilege to be involved in the graduation exercises at the Seminary. Walter now serves officially as Dean of Curriculum for Matongo Lutheran Theological College. This position is equivalent to that of Academic Dean in the USA. Our Bachelor in Theology program is being reworked—something on which Walter will be working steadily—so that Matongo will continue to be the strongest theological seminary in Africa.
