



Catechetical Comments

A Series

THE APOSTLES' CREED

This month we continue our look at The Apostles' Creed and consider the following question: *Who is God?*

93. Who is God?

The *Small Catechism* continues its answer to this question by saying:

In His Word God has told us that He is

C. unchangeable (immutable)

It then offers the following Scripture passages in support of this answer:

Ps. 102:27 – You are the same, and Your years have no end.

Mal. 3:6 – I the LORD do not change.

James 1:17 – Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change.

To consider the immutability of God (His unchangeableness), by necessity extends to the ramifications of this quality of God's divine nature. Countless volumes have been filled with such discussions, but we will, in the few lines allotted, attempt to encapsulate that aspect of the question that rises most near the top of the pile, that question being: Is the immutability of God is a good thing or a bad thing?

A wife may say of her husband, "Year in, year out, he's always the same; he never changes."

On the face of it, it's not readily apparent whether she's glad of this or not. What if he's a violent drunkard? Or a spendthrift? She may have spent years ducking him when he's on a binge, or she may have to hold down a job to make up for his wasteful expenditures. On the other hand, maybe he's calmingly stable and his day-in, day-out dependability might give her the kind of security not many people enjoy.

So, that's really the question, isn't it. If God is eternal (another of His unique attributes), and He never changes, what does this mean for us who are neither eternal nor unchangeable? Is God's immutability a good thing or a bad thing?

Of course, to answer this question adequately, we have to know more about God's other attributes, especially those further down the list, such as: holy, just, faithful, good, merciful, gracious, and loving. This is not to say that attributes like eternal, immutable, almighty, omniscient, omnipresent, and so on, aren't important; they certainly are, but God would be those things even if He were not just, faithful, merciful, and the like. The difference is that an all-powerful, eternal, unchangeable God that is merciful, gracious, and kind is a whole lot easier to live with than a God who isn't any of those things.

Like the woman whose husband is a reliable, trustworthy fellow, rather than an angry beer-chugger, life with the God who loves us is a great deal better than it would be otherwise, for we may fear, love, and trust in Him, knowing that He is a God of compassion and always will be. As the psalmist says (Ps. 103:13) – "As a father shows compassion to his children, so the LORD shows compassion to those who fear him."

From the Principal "Sin and Love on Display"

Think about the One who died for you and me on the cross. That death was so that we might live in freedom – being freed from our sin, being freed from the fear of death, and being freed from the grip of the grave. Just One died for us that day, Jesus Christ. But His death means more for us than the deaths of all the others who may have died for us combined. Because on the cross, it was not one man dying for another man. No. On the cross, God died for me. The High died for the low. The Shepherd died for the sheep. The Creator died for His creation. The Perfect died for the sinful.

As the prophet Isaiah records: "He was wounded for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities; upon Him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with His stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to His own way; and the Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all."

Luther said that with this picture of the cross, we come to know both God and ourselves. We come to know ourselves because look, that is your sin there. Your transgressions, your iniquities, your chastisement, your stripes, your death. The evil deeds your hands have done are the nails through His hands. The evil places your feet have taken you are the nails through His feet. The evil thoughts which fill your mind are the thorns which pierce His head. The evil lust which fills your heart is the spear which is thrust up into His side. The lies and venom that spew from your mouth are the mocks and taunts which fill His ears. . . . Take a good look, fellow sinners, at your sin. See what you have done.

But in seeing this, do not despair. Do not let guilt and grief overtake you, because your Lord Jesus Christ is <u>not</u> there <u>un</u>willingly. Although He was put on the cross by force, it was not force that put Him there. It was love. His love for you. Yes, His love. For as Jesus told His disciples, "No one takes my life from me, but I lay it down of my own accord." (John 10:18) It was not Judas, or the Jews, or Pilate, or our sins that took Jesus' life from Him. No, He laid it down of His own accord. He laid it down because of His great love for His Father, and for you. That you might be free. And so although on the cross He suffered and struggled under the torments of our sin and the abandonment of His Father – He dies <u>not</u> in struggle, but in peace and confidence, saying, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

By looking at the cross we come not just to know ourselves and the seriousness of our sin, but to know God. For there we see Him as He really is. His heart on display for <u>all</u> to see. He *wanted* to be there. And in His death, in just <u>one</u> drop of His perfect blood, is the remission of all our sin. The price paid in full. The punishment meted out in full measure. . .. It was no surprise to Jesus, our Savior. He knew exactly what He was in for. He knew these words from the prophet Isaiah, which so describe what He would be subjected to. For He told His disciples, "everything that is written about the Son of Man by the prophets will be accomplished." (Luke 18:31) And that all was accomplished He states right before He dies, using the same word He had said earlier to His disciples: "It is accomplished. It is finished." He has fulfilled all the Scriptures – nothing more need to be done. He has accomplished our salvation – nothing more need to be done. He has set us free – nothing more need be done!

Yet Isaiah provides another detail for us in his prophecy, by which we come to know God. For he says, "It was the will of the Lord to crush Him; He has put Him to grief; [yet] when His soul makes an offering for sin, He shall see His offspring; He shall prolong His days." . . . God intended all along for life to trump death. For a dead man cannot see his offspring, and his days have come to an end. But not for Jesus! For although He dies, He will see His offspring, those who will be born of water and the Spirit. And although He dies his days will be prolonged. Because our death cannot end His life! He did really die, make no mistake about that! But He would rise and live again. Isaiah knew it, and so prophesied here of the resurrection of Jesus from the dead; . . . and Jesus knew it too. And so He could die in confidence and peace, knowing that His sacrifice would be acceptable to His Father, knowing that His through His death, He would defeat the power of death once and for all.

Now therefore this is also true for you. Now death cannot end your life either, and <u>you</u> can face death with confidence and peace. For the Suffering Servant of Isaiah, the Lamb of God, died for you. We give thanks for such an unspeakable gift. Let the horror of the crucifixion appall you, as you see what your sin hath wrought. And then you will also know the love of God, who died for you, to set you free. "And if the Son sets you free, you are free indeed." (John 8:36) Amen.

Two opportunities for financial aid/scholarships for church worker students.

South Wisconsin District Financial Aid applications are **due May 15**. Anyone attending a Concordia University or Seminary, is a member of an LCMS congregation in the SWD and is preparing to be a full-time church worker (pastor, teacher, deaconess, DCE/DCO, DFLM, DPM, lay minister) is encouraged to apply. There are two applications required (District Financial Aid Application and Personal Aid Application). Both are available on the SWD website – swd.lcms.org/resources/student-aid-applications/.

LWML Female Church Worker Scholarship

The LWML South Wisconsin District has been blessed to be able to award scholarships each year since 1991 to women from South Wisconsin District who are preparing for church work in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. An endowment was established to assist women with their undergraduate education. The number and amount of scholarships varies from year to year depending on the funds available that year. Applications are currently being accepted for the 2023-2024 school year.

Who may apply? Active female members of congregations of the South Wisconsin District of the LCMS who are residents of the SWD prior to college and are preparing for "full-time service in the LCMS" are encouraged to apply. An applicant must be enrolled as an undergraduate at one of the educational institutions of the Synod for the 2023-2024 school year. (Full-time service is defined as any position available through the Board of Assignments of the Synod)

How to apply? Complete the LWML scholarship application forms and return them to the LWML SWD Scholarship Committee. All applications and references <u>must be postmarked no later than April 30, 2023.</u> Application instructions and forms are available online at http://www.lwml-swd.org/scholarships, scroll to the bottom.

Saying hello and making people feel welcome is a way every one of us can use our time, talents and resources to help increase God's church.
