

Catechetical Comments

A Series

THE APOSTLES' CREED

This month we continue our look at The Apostles' Creed and consider the following question: *Who is God?*

93. Who is God?

In His Word God has told us that He is

H. just (fair and impartial)

The Small Catechism further answers the question Who Is God? by saying:

In His Word God has told us that He is

H. just (fair and impartial)

It then offers the following Scripture passage in support of this answer:

Deut. 32:4 – The Rock, His work is perfect, for all His ways are justice. A God of faithfulness and without iniquity.

"It's not fair!" What parent hasn't heard this objection? The little imp didn't get the toy he wanted, or didn't get picked for the side he wanted at recess, or didn't get the grade on the book report he thought he should have. "It's not fair!" is the common declaration.

But what is fairness really? Isn't it treating everyone equally? The child might have a point if all the other children got things of similar value that they wanted. But that's not usually what is meant by "That's not fair!"

What is usually meant is, "I didn't get what I wanted!" And the presumption is that he or she *should* have gotten what they wanted. But, as my mother and father would have responded, "Nobody ever said you'd get everything you wanted." The truth is, nobody ever promised that life would be fair.

It's true that life is not always fair; *people* are not always fair. They play favorites or exclude those they don't like. The rules are sometimes different for one person than they are for another. People are sometimes unfair.

But not so with God. God loves everybody, treats everybody, equally. St. Paul writes to Timothy that God "desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4). And to the Galatians he says that, as far as God is concerned, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male or female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:28). And, finally, to the Romans he writes, "God shows no partiality (Rom. 2:11).

So God is always fair. Except He isn't.

What would you say of someone who punished an innocent person and let the guilty one go free? Is that fair? Hardly! And yet, that is how our just and fair God has dealt with our sin. He took the punishment due us and laid it on someone else. But here's the catch: The one He laid it on was Himself. Jesus willingly suffered for our sins so that we may be forgiven; He died our death so that we could live. It's not fair! But God was willing to suffer injustice because justice would have slain us. We're not like Him. We can't come back from the dead by our own power. But He could. He can. He did.

It wasn't fair. It wasn't just. But it's what we needed. And God, who loves us to death, did just that. And now He lives. And so shall we. It isn't fair, but we are ever so grateful! +

Trinity Lutheran school News – September 2023

"I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:5).

I am excited about our worship themes for this school year. We are going to explore "connections." Jesus connects with His disciples in our theme text from the Gospel of John, chapter 15.

The disciples were familiar with the vineyards in the region where Jesus lived and taught. If the plants were rooted in good soil and received adequate moisture and sunshine, the vines typically produced good fruit. Vines not connected to the plant would dry up, and it would be impossible for them to produce fruit. Disconnected and dried-up vines were fruitless and worthless and would be destroyed.

John 15 shares one of the "I am" statements of Jesus. Jesus says, "I am the vine." Jesus is the life-giving vine. Jesus is the life-giving vine because He gave His life for us. The Father, who owns the vineyard, sent His only Son into the vineyard. On the cross, Jesus became lifeless, making the sacrifice for our sins. In His resurrection, Jesus came back to life so that all might live eternally through Him.

Jesus connects us to the life that He gives. Just as the branches need water to stay alive, we receive the water of Baptism, which brings life to us. Jesus continues to give us the water of the Word.

Our Trinity Lutheran school is connected to Jesus, the Vine. We will celebrate that connection in our weekly chapel service, in our classroom devotions and Bible lessons, and in our worship together in the Divine Service. This year, we will experience many connections in our school: connecting with friends; connecting with other classes and teams, connecting with teachers, pastors, and school staff, connecting with new information and experiences in our classroom lessons. The most important connection is our daily connection with Jesus.

Because we are connected to Jesus, we bear fruit for Him. We will learn more about being a fruitful Lutheran school and being fruit-bearing pastors, teachers, students, and families during this school year. I am looking forward to connecting with Jesus and with you this year.

"If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you" (John 15:7).

PRAYER: Jesus, we thank You for being the Vine and connecting us to you. We pray that You bless our connections to You and Your Word in our chapel time, classroom devotions, Sunday worship, and in our family devotions. Amen.

A Life Lived for Others! - Stewardship Message

Ok, a little word association game: What's the first thing that comes to your mind when I say: "Good Neighbor?" I'm guessing most of you are thinking "its Jake from State Farm" or the jingle "Like a good neighbor." If you believe all those commercials, your State Farm Rep is the neighbor you want to have. Always there when you need him, day or night.

Since I am not here to sell you insurance, I want to talk about, "What is a good and loving neighbor from a biblical perspective?" Jesus uses the story of the Good Samaritan to teach us about being a good neighbor. In the story, it was the Samaritan that saw the man injured and wounded and did not pass by on the other side. He possibly even risked his life. He gave of his time and his resources, He loved. Jesus said in Mark 12:30-31, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength, and with all your mind: and Love your neighbor as yourself." For the Samaritan it was his way of life. Sacrificing, showing kindness showing love, not looking to get something out of it.

The scripture I just read leads one to believe the neighbor we are concerned with isn't them — It's us! It's not about "who is my neighbor?" It's about "am I a good neighbor?" Am I a good neighbor only to those that I like? Am I a good neighbor all the time or just when it is convenient for me? Being a loving neighbor can hurt sometimes and sometimes it takes sacrifice. Jesus does expect us to love our neighbors as we love ourselves. That is quite an expectation.

We have talked previously about some things you can do to be a good and loving neighbor. Prayer. Take a look at the weekly bulletins prayer list and pray for each person by name. Select a few people on the list you may not even know and send them a card or better yet, give them a call. Take a walk across the street from your home to meet a neighbor you don't know. Visit one of our shut in members. Help with the many activities around the church. Join Ladies Aide/LWML, help make quilts. Volunteer at a local hospital. Volunteer to do Hospice. Assist with our food pantry, Serve on one of our Boards. Our Time and Talent form provides plenty of opportunities to be a good and loving neighbor. Ask Jesus to make you a good and loving neighbor.

A friend of mine once told me that God doesn't need your good deeds, your neighbor does! How true!

In closing, Galatians 5:13 states, you, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh, rather, serve one another humbly in love".



Hey, Organist!!! ...

Well, why won't you play the hymn harmonizations the same for each stanza? ... the way they're written?? ...

Glad you asked! There's some great reasons — and you'll appreciate them. ... Ready? We (the organists) were trained to play the hymns — music AND text together (in our minds)! You know the hymns don't just have some music that we play. They have a text to each, and the text is different on each stanza. Each hymn tells a story, and each stanza may most likely have a different mood than the rest. Hence, the reason the organist plays each stanza differently: to match the mood of the music with the mood of the text. Stanza 1 may be happy, 2 may be solemn, 3 may be prayerful, 4 may be playful, 5 may be joyful and 6 may be triumphant. See the variations? Therefore, the stanzas shouldn't be played in the same way — they should be played to help you, the singer, feel the mood of each stanza.

Here's an example: LSB 528 "Oh, for a Thousand Tongues to Sing"

Hymn Stanzas

- 1 Oh, for a thousand tongues to sing My great Redeemer's praise, The glories of my God and King. The triumphs oof His grace!
- 2 My gracious Master and my God, Assist me to proclaim, To spread through all the earth abroad. The honors of Thy name.
- 3 Jesus! The name that charms our fears. That bids our sorrows cease;
- ' Tis music in the sinner's ears. 'Tis life and health and peace.
- 4 He breaks the power of canceled sin; He sets the prisoner free. His blood can make the foulest clean; His blood avails for me.
- 5 Look unto Him, ye nations, own Your God, ye fallen race. Look and be saved through faith alone. Be justified by grace.
- 6 See all your sins on Jesus laid; The Lamb of God was slain. His soul was once an offering made, For every soul of man.
- 7 To God all glory, praise and love, Be now and ever given By saints below and saints above, The Church in earth and heaven.

Organist Plays ...

- triumphant organ sound
- ► I might like to play the melody on the trumpet to proclaim, along with you'all
- ➤ a softer sound, more peaceful and less dramatic accompaniment
- ► BIG! Trumpet! exciting! (He set us free!!)
- ► Medium sound, nicely excited (because we are Justified by grace)
- ► Softly soloed out (because it's without music), And Softer because Jesus was an offering
- ► triumphant sound again!! Glory to God!!

Yes, it's also important to be able to sing the hymn in parts (SATB – Soprano, Alto, Tenor and Bass) for those who are familiar/know music. Several stanzas are usually played in this format (for your delight). No, we're not the kind of church that isn't allowed to sing in parts! Please do so. ... as infrequently as we play what's in the hymnal. ☺ (Otherwise, make up your own notes, yes? ♥)

By the Way: the PreService Music is not just there to "fill silence"...It's there to help you, the parishioners, prepare for worship, help you'all pray and "feel the mood" of the Day by the hymntunes that are played. See? It's not just the hymns ... it's all of the music – PreService, Offerings, Postlude.

Remember, God loves a joyful voice! It doesn't matter if it's on-pitch, or can count! Just sing a joyful noise unto the Lord!! Love, rose (Questions, comments – see Rose, 608.213.2644)
